## STATEMENT

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Well, at this moment, allow me give chance to a few Honourable Members to make some short remarks concerning the visiting delegation in the gallery. This is Mihuu Ward. We have Hon Mukhanya, Member for Ndivisi Ward.

**Hon. Alfred Mukhanya:** Thank you Mr. Speaker. Maybe just to welcome students from Mihuu who are my neighbours because this is a school in the neighbouring ward; that they are welcome today to this County Assembly of Bungoma. **Hon. Sheila Sifuma:** Thank you Mr. Speaker Sir for this opportunity and for allowing me to welcome my village mates from Lukusi. Lukusi Primary School is a school next to our home and I am so privileged this afternoon to welcome them to the Assembly. I want to encourage the students from Lukusi Primary School and the teachers that this Assembly is a place where everyone is equal and there is opportunity for everyone.

As I comment maybe to the students, work hard in your studies, do your best and the fact that you are studying or have been brought up from Lukusi village does not mean you cannot conquer the world. I want to take this time to appreciate the teachers for Lukusi for making an effort to bring the students to this Assembly. As you can see students and teachers, this is where we come. Sometimes people at home wonder where we normally go every day and that we do not go to ward offices; we are supposed to be here and do what we are doing in this Assembly. This is where we come as Honourable members from respective wards to represent you and do the legislative work that we are supposed to do as the MCAs for Bungoma County.

I wish to appreciate the students who also came and I want to encourage you as a mother and leader; that as you can see this Assembly we have Honourable lady MCAs .We have seven elected women MCAs and the rest are men. We have 45 wards and we have colleagues who are

## **CHAPTER TWO**

### **The Half Year Financial Statements for the Period Ended 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2023 in the Department Of Health and Sanitation**

The County's approved first supplementary budget for the FY 2023/24 was Kshs15,470,095,611 comprising of Kshs5,643,037,428 (36 per cent) and Kshs9, 827, 0528, 184 (64 per cent) allocation for development and recurrent programmes, respectively.

The largest part of the budget is expected from exchequer issues contributing 73.6 per cent of the requirement, local revenue 13 per cent and other receipts including grants 13.3 per cent.

The Department of Health had an approved supplementary of Kshs4, 103,728,886. Comprising Kshs3, 632,696,235 for recurrent and Kshs471, 032,651 on development. Sanitation had recurrent budget of Kshs2, 017, 430 and development of Kshs.15, 358, 366 totaling to 17,375,796.

#### **Revenue Realized**

The Department realized total revenues to a tune of Kshs1, 431,567,944 representing 34.8 per cent absorption: Kshs1, 410,248,140 recurrent and Kshs21, 319,804 on development.

The breakdown of the revenues realized is as follows:

#### **Expenditure Analysis**

#### **General Administration Planning and Support**

The Health Administration and Support Services unit was allocated a budget of Kshs126, 916,175, of which Kshs99, 243,425 was spent. This represents an absorption rate of 78 per cent, which is relatively high compared to other areas of the health budget.

The expenditure details for the activities undertaken by the sub-county hospitals were provided in the attached statements. During the review of the financial statements, the Committee issued a directive regarding the reporting format. They instructed that, going forward, the financial statements from individual health facilities should be consolidated with those of other departments.

Leadership and Governance spent Kshs23, 546,920 i.e. 68.2 per cent of the budget. The Department submitted that the amount relates to daily operational cost like board meetings allowance and traveling substance allowance incurred by the listed facilities.

Human resource management (salaries) had an allocation of Kshs2, 757,964,682 where they spent Kshs1, 043, 655, 533 which is equivalent to 37 per cent much more below the 50 per cent target in half year. The Department detailed personnel expenditure amounting to Kshs1, 042,454,224, as outlined below. Hon. Speaker I will skip this and Members can follow up on their gadgets.

Delays in receiving funds from the exchequer, led to the payment of salaries for December in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter.

Infrastructure development had an allocation of Kshs471, 032,651 where they utilized Kshs21, 319,804 which is equivalent to five per cent. The 300 Bed Capacity Mother and Child Hospital at BCRH was paid Kshs22, 610,331 for variation that was caused by inclusion of sewage system.

## **2. Preventive and promotive with total revenue of Kshs183, 305,894 attained the following:**

Reproductive, maternal, Newborn, child and Adolescent health had an allocation of Kshs15, 000,000 where they absorbed Kshs5, 000,000.

Specialized material and supplies had an allocation of Kshs507, 349,707 where Kshs178, 305,894 was utilized. The list provided is as follows:

### 3. Curative Health Services

Routine medical services had allocation of Kshs105, 172,120 recording expenditure worth utilized Kshs32, 481,062 which is equivalent to 31 per cent.

DANIDA/UNICEF had an allocation of Kshs46, 408,065 where they absorbed Kshs28, 015,305.

**Public Health & Sanitation** with a total allocation of Kshs24.1 million recorded no expenditures.

#### Imprest and Outstanding Imprest

The Department of Health un-surrendered imprest amount Kshs10, 186,320 relating to the period July-Dec, 2023. The activities done by the imprests are shared below:

The Department shared the activities done as indicated in the imprests. The imprests have since been surrendered and will be reported in the nine months' financial statements for the period ended 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2024.

### **Pending Bills/Accounts Payable**

The report indicates that the Department paid pending bills as captured below:

- ✓ Biju Insurance agency (insurance cover) Kshs1, 004,100.
- ✓ Webmar investment ltd (Fuel) Kshs1,965, 517.25
- ✓ Amylin Chemists(non-pharms) Kshs797,500
- ✓ Bungoma Chemist(drugs) Kshs117,000
- ✓ Dovas Pharmacy (non-pharms) Kshs498,650

It is unclear where the money to pay the pending bills came from, as there was no specific budget allocation for this purpose. However, the Department indicated that the County Treasury provided direction to treat pending bills as a "first charge" against the current budget. This means that funds from the existing budget were used to settle these outstanding obligations before financing any other activities. While this approach ensures pending bills are paid, it also reduces the amount of funding available for planned current-year expenditures; which could create new budgetary pressures or lead to the deferral of important spending. This directive also goes against the PFMA, 2012 which states that an Accounting Officer shall ensure that public funds entrusted to their care are properly safeguarded and are applied for purposes for which they were intended and appropriated by the County Assembly.

The inclusion of unpaid June, 2023 salaries for all sub-county hospital staff in the pending bills list raises concerns. No explanation was given for why these wages remained outstanding by the Treasury. This also casts doubt on whether salaries for the following months from July to December, 2023 were disbursed.

However, the Department later clarified that listing the June salary as a pending bill was an error, as the delayed payment was eventually made in July. They further confirmed that subsequent salaries have been paid through November, 2023.

### **Departmental Appropriation- In- Aid (AIA)**

It is noted that the Department of Health facilities collected and spent Kshs291.9 million, achieving a performance of 25 per cent against set targets. However, there is a lack of data in the report by the County treasury regarding the performance of the 11 facilities, both in terms of revenue generation and expenditures, compared to the approved budget. During interrogation session with the department revenue realized was submitted as indicated below. Honourable Members, I will skip this and allow you to follow on your gadgets.

The analysis shows BCRH, Kimilili, Bokoli had an over 40 per cent against the set targets while the rest performed poorly. None of the facilities hit the 50 per cent mark.

The targets are not realistic or achievable because they not set by individual facilities nor at the health headquarter. Imaging services are not offered in other facilities hence an explanation on the low collection. The primary health care programme when rolled out will help reduce the targets for the facilities.

## **CHAPTER THREE**

### **Committee's Observations and Recommendations**

#### **Committee's Observations**

1. The overall absorption rate for the Department of Health's recurrent budget was only 34.8 per cent by half year, indicating significant under spending. The development budget absorption was even lower at just 4.5 per cent.
2. Many individual line items had very low absorption rates below 50 per cent, such as specialized materials and supplies (2.5 per cent), printing and advertising (2.3 per cent), routine maintenance (0-0.8 per cent) and purchase of furniture and equipment (0-1 per cent).
3. Some hospitals and sub-county units significantly overspent their budgets in certain areas, such as domestic travel (146 per cent at Webuye), utility bills (electricity 125 per cent at Kimilili) and committees/conferences (293 per cent at Kimilili, 158 per cent at Chwele).
4. Spending on essential medical supplies like drugs, non-pharmaceuticals, lab materials, and X-ray supplies was quite low, often in the 30-40 per cent range and as low as 3-4 per cent in some cases. This results in shortages of key items.
5. The reports sub-county units are spending their budgets outside the IFMIS platform as seen on over expended votes. This practice undermines transparency, accountability, and effective control over public funds. It can lead to irregularities, misuse of resources, and a lack of reliable financial data for decision-making.

6. Expenditure reporting appears inconsistent across units, with varying formats and levels of detail, making comparisons difficult. The expenditure figures are above the AIA realized in the facilities.

### **Committee's Recommendations**

1. **THAT** the County treasury should urgently investigate the reasons behind the low overall absorption of approved budgets. Identify and address bottlenecks in procurement, cash flow, and budget execution.
2. **THAT** the Chief Officer Health and Sanitation should establish and enforce budgetary discipline as an expenditure control measure, especially for travel, imprest, committees, and utilities, to prevent unsanctioned over-expenditure.
3. **THAT** the department should prioritize spending on core medical supplies to ensure adequacy throughout the year. Future budgets should have funding re-allocated from non-essential areas.
4. **THAT** all sub-county health units must use IFMIS for all financial transactions, in compliance with the PFMA and County Governments Act. Training and support should be provided to sub-county staff on how to effectively use IFMIS for budgeting, expenditure management, and reporting. The department should report implementation status to the committee within 90 days from the adoption of this report.
5. **THAT** the department should standardize reporting formats across all units to enable easier consolidation, comparison and analysis.
6. **THAT** the department should build the capacity of facility staff in financial management and reporting to ensure data quality and timeliness.

Thank you Mr. Speaker; I call upon the Chairperson of this Committee, Hon. Makari to second the motion.

*(Applause)*

**Hon. George Makari:** Thank Mr. Speaker. I rise to second the motion and also congratulate Hon. Katili for moving this report. On the issue of pending bills; if you look at the report they explained every other aspect of the report. Where we found the problem is that they paid pending bills without a provision in the budget. Even if you say that you are treating pending bills as a first charge when paying using a budget for another financial year; still you would have affected other projects and eventually they will also become pending bills. We did not find this well that they used the current budget to pay a pending bill thus opening an avenue for other projects to become pending. Otherwise, I want to second the report and ask that Members adopt it.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Thank You Hon. Makari, Member for Musikoma Ward.

*(Question proposed)*

**Hon. Job Mukoyandali:** Thank you Hon. Speaker. I begin by lauding Hon. Katila for moving the report. It is a good report which can help us move forward. I am so much interested in the areas where timelines have been given and how I wish that every report could come with such resolutions where resolutions are pinned to an individual who is supposed to act on something in particular and you also look at the timelines that have been given. The report is very clear that after the adoption of this report and within 90 days, action should be taken. That is reporting back to the mother committee.

If this House will take that direction in terms of how we come up with our reports, it is going to reduce a lot of pressure to other committees; for instance the Committee on Implementation. Such that this time round, we are strictly following what our laws of the House say, especially when we look at our Bill 205; it gives that direction that the Executive should always report back to the mother committee first before the Committee on Implementation takes up.

I just want to loud Hon. Makari, who is the Chair of that Committee for giving direction and coming up with such a watertight report that is really going to help this House moving forward.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Thank you Hon. Lubwani Mukoyandali Job, Member for West Bukusu... Hon. Johnston Okasida, Ipara, Member for Tongaren/ Kiminini?

**Hon. Johnson Ipara:** Thank you Hon. Speaker. Let me start by appreciating the mover of the report and thanking the whole committee for their comprehensive report that gives information that is very important to this House. Let me begin from the first item. When I looked at that report, I saw something about *boda boda* sensitization and I wondered where this sensitization was carried out? When the mover of the report comes back, let her also talk about where sensitization was done, particularly which wards and how many were they and what was the cost?

Secondly on the pending bills, I am a bit baffled when it is said that the pending bills were paid and yet these items were not among the items approved on the budget for that particular department. Where such a things happens it means that the people are practicing the highest order of impunity where they don't respect the laws and particularly the Procurement and Disposal Act.

It is clearly stated in the law that an item that you are supposed to pay for or to buy must be reflected. The question to ask here is, if really they were paying for security services, which are guards and I want to believe these are term contracts which are renewed yearly or are tendered after the expiry of the financial year. What I would like the mover of the report to be very clear on is; were the guard item there in the previous financial year and where it incurred a pending bill which was carried forward to the subsequent financial year; and if it was carried out to the subsequent year, how does it become an item which is foreign that was not under the budget?

Who is trying to create confusion to the Honourable Members? So they must check on that one and if it is an error then it must be corrected.

Lastly on the imprest, I wonder because the law is very clear that if you apply for an imprest, you must have surrendered the previous imprest held. Then how comes officers who have not surrendered the imprest are given money. This is an area that I wished to plead with the Committee, that next time we must not practice leniency when we are dealing with the people who abuse the regulations that are set out. These are people that amongst the recommendations we could have recommended that their salary must be attached to clear up so that we set an example.

We have been complaining where we have in a department Kshs100 million which has not been surrendered and we are told that the officers are still in the field performing their duties. I support with those observations.

*(Applause)*

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Thank you The Hon. Ipara Johnson Okasida, Member for Tongaren/Kiminini.

**Hon. Joseph Nyongesa:** Thank you Speaker. First allow me applaud the mover and the Committee leadership and Hon. George Makari for coming up with such a report. Just on one item, the issue of paying pending bills which was not budgeted for. If you recall, we had a meeting with the Cabinet in our hall here and we categorically agreed that pending bills shall be paid basing on verification and the area leader should also give an input while ensuring that that project was done.

So here comes an item that was paid yet it was not budgeted for. Although Hon. Job said that they have already given a resolution but still the Committee on Implementation can still make a follow up; because one thing that you are paying for was not budget for. It is either, you have an interest, it is your friend, or you are the contractor and you are working in that department. So the Committee on Implementation where Hon. Mukoyandali is the Vice, kindly make a follow up so that we dig deeper into it to establish why it was paid yet it was not verified. I support.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Thank you. Hon. Joseph Nyongesa Juma, Member for Tuuti/Marakaru and our Leader of majority. May I now call the mover to reply.

**Hon. Maureen Katila (Mover):** Thank you Hon. Speaker.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Hon. Maureen, can you be audible enough.

**Hon. Maureen Katila:** Thank you Hon. Speaker. I have noted and taken in all the concerns. We will go back and revisit with the department. I therefore call upon the House to adopt the report.

*(Applause)*

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Very well... Thank you Hon. Khanjila, Honorable Members, a motion having been moved, seconded, debate having ensued and a reply made; allow me now put the question.

*(Question put and agreed to)*

## **CHAPTER THREE**

### **Public Administration**

The total budget for Public Administration for the financial year 2023/24 was Kshs899, 957,337 as per the approved first supplementary budget comprising of a total of Kshs848, 244,097 recurrent budget and Kshs51, 713,240 on development budget; translating to a composition of 94 per cent and six per cent respectively. Included in the recurrent budget is Kshs6, 000,000 towards Sub-county Administration.

### **Revenue**

The amount released and expended in the half year amounted to Kshs249,021,136 representing 28 per cent of the total budget absorption and 29 per cent recurrent budget absorption. Sub-county Administration had budget absorption of 60 per cent. During the period, there was no expenditure on Development. The recurrent expenditures incurred are as follows:-

General administration with a budget of Kshs881, 543,221 had absorption of Kshs235, 271,136 translating to 26.7 per cent. The breakdown of the expenditures underneath is:

- Salaries Kshs185, 408,367 recording 43 per cent absorption.
- Utilities consumed Kshs4 million leaving a balance of Kshs1.7 million.
- Operation had an allocation of Kshs41, 326,038 and absorption Kshs36, 000,000 which is equivalent to 87 per cent absorption. A highlight of the activities done include:

  - ✓ payment for ward office rent Kshs1,202,317.25

## **CHAPTER FOUR**

### **Committee's Observations**

The Committee made the following observations;

1. **THAT**, payments were made on items which were not captured in the approved PBB e. g payments for contracted guards and cleaning services, KICOSCA and Rent for state officer in the last term.
2. **THAT**, Officers were advanced imprests without considering whether previously held imprests have been surrendered, resulting in multiple un-surrendered imprests held by an individual. Further, Imprests were advanced to staff on contractual terms; which is against the PFM Regulations.
3. **THAT**, most imprest activities have resultant reports that should be submitted to the Assembly for consideration. Apart from the SDU report, planning and budgeting documents, other reports are yet to be submitted to the County Assembly e.g. Reports emanating from foreign trips and domestic trips.
4. **THAT**, there is Lack of budgetary control with most programs recording 100 per cent in the half year especially in the Governor's budget.

5. **THAT**, there is Non-disclosure of activities/projects done under the special programs expenditures. There is lack of policy guiding special programs operations.
6. **THAT**, Rent for ward office is in arrears which has led to closure of some ward offices

### **Committee's Recommendations**

The Committee made the following recommendations

1. **THAT**, the budgets **MUST** be implemented as approved pursuant to PFMA 149 (1).
2. **THAT**, The Accounting Officers **MUST** comply with the provisions of Regulation 93(5), (6), (7) and (8) of the Public Finance Management Regulations, 2015 in respect to management of Imprest.
3. **THAT**, Reports should be submitted to the County Assembly in order to ascertain value for money within 14 days after adoption of this report.
4. **THAT**, Expenditures relating to Governor and Deputy Governor's office should be controlled in order to operate within the CRA ceiling approved by Senate.
5. **THAT**, Accounting Officer should comply with PFMA 166(2) in disclosing expenditure items and activities done. This promotes transparency and accountability in government spending.
6. **THAT**, Pending bills should be paid by second quarter to avoid litigations and also in line with the County treasury circular that put pending bills a first charge.

The adoption schedule; the members of the sectorial committee on Public Administration and ICT hereby adopt and append signatures on this report.

I call upon Hon. Bridgit Katasi to second the report.

**Hon. Bridgit Katasi:** Thank you Mr. Speaker Sir, I rise to second the motion and before I make my comments, I wish to thank the mover who has taken us through the motion eloquently otherwise I second the motion

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Thank you Hon. Lusike for seconding the motion. Honourable Members, allow me then propose to the House the motion

*(Motion proposed)*

**Hon. Milliah Masungo:** Thank you Hon. Speaker for giving me an opportunity to give my views on the motion that has been read before us. I want to insist and send my message to the Executive, that the issue of pending bills and being the first charge in every budget we do, they should actualize what they tell us. We have always proposed as sector committees on the issue of pending bills and insisting on pending bills being first charges whenever we receive any exchequer, but it has landed on deaf ears so let the executive take note of this. Otherwise the

same impeachment motion going on in the National Assembly will soon be here because we are no longer going to wait until we lose elections on the ground so that people act; we are going to do it.

**Hon. Johnston Ipara:** Thank you Hon. Speaker. I rise to support this report on the basis of the following points,

We understand that these financial reports are reported purposely to offer a tool for monitoring for Honourable Members and in particular for committees. They also offer an opportunity for us to see whether the Department is adhering to the rules that govern both procurement and administration and if there is diversion of funds. The third thing that I raise to support is that this report informs whether resource allocation was done equitably and whether in that direction it may demand that we ask for supplementary on the budget due to deficiency in the initial allocation for funds.

This report is also the basis for budget adjustments. We may require that within the department some of the items that had more money need an internal adjustment which must be informed by a clear report filed by the department taken to the committee and the committee supports and submits to the Honourable House where we are. The other important thing on such reports, I am saying this because we may think that it is a waste of time; it is not, it prepares us to debate and make informed decisions for future. Lastly it offers you an opportunity to compare the financial years and periods whether they are tallying or not and if they are not what is the reason. I support, Hon. Speaker.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Thank you Hon. Ipara, Hon. Peter Caleb Wanjala?

**Hon. Caleb Wanjala:** Thank you Hon. Speaker. As much as I also support the report, I have a few things I would like to raise on the report. First of all is the issue of pending bills. Just like my colleague has said, we have severally in this House talked about this issue of pending bills but nothing is coming forth. I don't know why we are not prioritizing the pending bills. I speak this because if you look at the contracted guards, this is a service that is offered daily and majority of the people under contracted guards are our young boys and girls. As we speak today, some of them have gone almost six months without salary, they are demoralized, defamed, and I don't know how they feel like... I think this one should be given priority.

Another issue is that we have our young people who are entrepreneurs in this County. Some of them offered their services to this great County of Bungoma, some went as far as borrowing loans in micro finance institutions with an aim of making something out of it but as we speak today, some of them have been auctioned; some of them their plots have been sold, some of them even ran away and some of their families have been destroyed. I think it is high time as a House, you know wise people say speaking is one thing and doing is another thing; and if we do things in the same way we have been doing, the results obviously will be the same. So as much as I support the report, my urge is that the issue of pending bills should be given first priority. I am saying this because majority of the Finance officers in different departments say that they have made a requisition of payment on some of the projects already done but there is no action that has been taken. As much as I support this report...

**Hon. Joseph Nyongesa:** (*On a Point of Information*) Thank you Mr. Speaker. Let me just inform the member who is the Vice Chair of this Committee and he appended the signature on this report. Observation number one; that payments were made on items which were not captured in the approved PBB e.g. payment of contracted guards and cleaning services, KICOSCA and rent for state officers in the last term. I think you have heard what Hon. Caleb was alleging and if you compare with the observations he made as the Vice Chairperson of the Committee then tell me now who owns this report?

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Hon. Caleb Wanjala, if you are a Member of the Committee make yourself clear because there was no descending opinion forwarded.

**Hon. Caleb Wanjala:** I began by saying that I do support the report but that doesn't limit me from giving my notions over the same, it doesn't limit me. I support the report...

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** You know those were supposed to be done because you are part of the report, it should have been done when you were there! Yes Hon. Milliah?

**Hon. Milliah Masungo:** (*On a Point of Information*) Hon. Speaker, we are not going to be deceived by some members of the Committee here who come up with a report and then turn against the report on the Floor of the House. What Hon. Caleb is bringing to us is that he is not agreeing with the report. As members of the House, we think otherwise because the way you are putting it, you are disagreeing with your recommendations in the report.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** I will give you a chance to complete your submissions Hon. Caleb, but remember; you can lead the House into rejecting the report or adopting the report, proceed.

**Hon. Caleb Wanjala:** You need to be fair because I began by saying as much as I support the report... so that doesn't limit me to speak my mind. This is a legislative House and so I am not opposing the report. Mr. Speaker, I submit.

**Hon. Florence Juma:** Thank you Hon. Speaker I rise to support the report, but only request that next time you are inviting spouses to the MCAs, kindly remember to invite mine too. I support

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Well, let us call the mover.

**Hon. Tony Barasa (Mover):** Thank you Hon. Speaker. I want to laud all the members who have contributed to this matter and key among them has been the payment of the pending bills. I wish to urge this House and the leader of Government Business in this House, I know he has taken note that we must do communication so that the Executive can make a serious commitment on issues to do with payment of pending bills. I also want to laud Hon. Milliah Masungo; she has also come out strongly on issues of the pending bills. We have passed some legislation and adopted reports here but we don't want these reports to go to the Executive...they are kept under the table; we need some actions to be taken.

On issues of payment of our sons and daughters who are offering cleaning services or working as guards, it is an issue that we also observed. That the County Executive went to pay for those sons and daughters of ours but they paid without the money that was approved by this House. It was not captured, they did, but we are saying going forward; they must go with the budget approved

by this House and also making pending bills a priority. With that I beg the House to adopt the report.

**The Deputy Speaker:** Thank you Hon. Khaoya, Honourable Members, a report having been moved and duly seconded, debate ensued and reply made, I now put the question
